**ORDER TERMINATING PROBATION AND
REINSTATING PHARMACIST LICENSE**

By Order dated May 31, 1989 ("the 1989 Order"), the Maryland Board of Pharmacy (the "Board") found Robert H. Brandon, P.D. (the "Respondent") guilty of violating Section 12-311(b) (14) and (23) of the Health Occupations Article. The Board ordered that Respondent's license to practice pharmacy in the State of Maryland be Suspended. The suspension was immediately stayed and Respondent was placed on probation subject to certain conditions (the "Conditions of Probation").

By letter received March 14 1990, Respondent petitioned the Board for reinstatement of his license to practice pharmacy in Maryland without any condition or restriction. At the Board's meeting on April 18, 1990, the Respondent presented his petition for reinstatement. Based on its review of that petition and the reports submitted to the Board by the persons monitoring Respondent's progress pursuant to the Conditions of Probation, the Board determined that Respondent had satisfactorily fulfilled all of the Conditions of Probation contained in the 1989 Order.

FINDINGS OF FACT

The Board finds that Respondent has satisfactorily complied with all the Conditions of Probation imposed by its 1989 Order.

CONCLUSIONS OF LAW

The Board concludes as a matter of law that it is appropriate to terminate Respondent's Conditions of Probation and to REINSTATE his pharmacist license without any condition or restriction.

ORDER

UPON THE FOREGOING Findings of Fact and Conclusions of Law, it is this

9 day of May, 1990 by a unanimous vote of a quorum of the Board

ORDERED that effective as of the date of this Order, the Conditions of Probation imposed on Respondent's practice of pharmacy by the Board's 1989 Order are hereby **TERMINATED** and of no force and effect; and be it further

ORDERED that Respondent's license to practice pharmacy in the State of Maryland be **REINSTATED** without any condition or restriction whatsoever.
